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## Washington School Administrators Vote to Oppose I-1366

Constitutional two-thirds requirement for taxes would only add to state's K-12 funding woes

**OLYMPIA**—The Washington Association of School Administrators (WASA) has voted to oppose Initiative 1366, amending the constitution to authorize a supermajority rule and require a two-thirds vote of the Legislature to raise taxes. The association's Executive Committee voted unanimously to oppose the measure.

"If Initiative 1366 were to pass, a minority of 17 legislators — from either party — could block reforms to Washington's regressive tax system," said Dr. Frank Hewins, WASA president and superintendent of the Franklin Pierce School District. "From the perspective of public schools, and where we are in terms of K-12 funding in this state, Initiative 1366 would further muddy the funding waters and complicate what is already a very complex and as yet unresolvable challenge," he added.

Dr. Bill Keim, WASA executive director, said the ballot measure would do little to resolve the already complex landscape lawmakers face in addressing K-12 funding in our state.

"Lawmakers face a growing array of funding challenges. Initiative 1366 does not give them any tools to solve them, and, in fact, it may cause further delays and challenges," he said. "From our members' perspective, lawmakers are already scrambling to meet the Supreme Court's decision under McCleary. This would only exacerbate an already tenuous situation, one that demands bipartisan leadership and thinking to solve one of the most vital issue for our state."
